

ATTRACTING BIRDS TO THE LANDSCAPE PRESENTER: JEFF MILLER

Jeff Miller has worked for the DeLong Company of Clinton, WI for 49 years. They create bird seed mixes for bird seed stores, such as Wild Birds Unlimited, but do not sell to the box stores. They buy almost all their seed from growers within the United States. Jeff said that their mixes are created and shipped to stores within two weeks, so the seed is very fresh. His slide show contained beautiful pictures of birds at feeders, and they were all taken in his own yard!

Tips:

- 1. Separate several types of seed in various feeders
- 2. Don't put a feeder closer than 6' from a house or tree to distract squirrels from jumping to feeder
- 3. Clean feeders regularly with white vinegar or a weak bleach solution (1 TBLS bleach /gallon of water)
- 4. Have more feeders than your neighbors!!
- 5. Keep your feeders full

Here is a list of the different types of bird seed to attract birds:

BIRD SEED TYPE	SEED USED FOR AND BY		
Black Oil Sunflower	The best "single seed" for bird feeding since it attracts the widest variety of birds.		
	Sourced from South Dakota and Minnesota		
Stripe Sunflower	Preferred by Blue Jays. Sourced from South Dakota and Minnesota		
Sunflower Meats	"No mess" seed. Sunflowers are 35% hulls, which are not eaten. This is the best s		
	for attracting birds. Sourced from South Dakota		
White Millet	Very popular with small birds. It is NOT A FILLER. Sourced from Colorado		
Safflower	Contains a very healthy oil. Well-liked by Cardinals, Chickadees, and Nuthatches.		
	This is the least favorite food for squirrels and grackles. Sourced from Idaho and		
	Montana.		
Golden Safflower	Extremely thin shell, which means less waste. Contains 15% more oil, has 25%		
	higher protein, and 30% higher fat content. Sourced from Montana		
Red Millet	Used mainly for color and eye appeal. Sourced from Colorado		
Cracked Corn	Very high energy food enjoyed by Blue Jays, Cardinals, and other colorful birds.		
	Sourced from Wisconsin		
Wheat	High energy food and mostly eaten by ground feeders (Doves and Juncos). Sourced		
	from Wisconsin		
Peanut Pieces	Maybe the best attractant for all colorful birds. Try adding them if you're not getting		
	a lot of birds		
Whole Peanuts	Preferred by Blue Jays and Cardinals (and squirrels). Sourced from North Carolina		
Grit and Oyster Shells	Helps with digestion and egg production. Sourced from North Carolina and		
	Mississippi		
Milo	Often confused with red millet. Milo is a large red grain similar in nutrition to corn,		
	however, it's bred to be distasteful to birds! Only pigeons and dove eat milo when		
	other seeds are not available. Many box store brands can contain up to 70% of milo		
	to keep their prices down.

CHICKADEE AND NUTHATCH	Any type of feeder	 Whole safflower meats, peanut pieces, black sunflower, millets, and safflower Look for bags of: Chickadee Food Gourmet No Waste Cardinal Food Delco Premium
JUNCO (SNOW BIRD) Here from November to April	Above ground and platform feeders	Any quality bird food except Milo

PINE SISKIN AND REDPOLL	Any type of feeder but the most	Nyjer thistle, sunflower meats,
They may only visit when food is short where they normally winter	Any type of feeder but the most popular is a "nyjer tube" feeder	Nyjer thistle, sunflower meats, sunflowers, and safflower <u>Look for bags of:</u> Wild Finch Plus
