## Starting Flowers From Seed Indoors vs Outdoors

Some flowers should only be direct sown for the best results, while many others will benefit from being started indoors — especially in areas with shorter growing seasons. Whether starting indoors or out, timing is important. Seedlings started indoors too early will get too big and leggy. Outdoors, tender seedlings may be killed by frost. The following lists provide the ideal sowing time for common flower seeds, many of which are flexible and appear on both lists.
